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

#### **Anniversary of NETWORK**

On April 22, 2022, NETWORK celebrated its 50th anniversary and honored its founders, among which was our own Mary Gabriel Herbers, RGS (RIP). Good Shepherd participated in the celebration to show support for NETWORK's advocacy for social justice and to mark a historical continuation of such an endeavor.

Seeking justice and peace is in our DNA, as Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of the Good Shepherd. It is said that St. John Eudes would preach truth to the king of France and St. Mary Euphrasia would advocate for the wronged women to their wrongdoers.

Since our beginnings, we have so many stories that show how we respond to the compelling call for justice, through advocacy, giving voice to the voiceless and acting with justice for and with those in difficult situations who are oppressed and disparaged.

We know that whatever we do, we do it with zeal, bringing to light the dignity of each person, and for that we must seek justice.

As we celebrated the 50th anniversary of NETWORK, we also celebrated the life of Sister Gabriel, who was not shy about seeking justice. Many of you remember her courage in organizing, picketing, talking to the media, and persevering for the cause of justice. She accomplished many good things, including closing an adult club and unseating an unfair judge. She was extremely astute in knowing how systems work and who to approach. She had no discernible fear when she had a mission in sight.

#### Celebrating 50 years of love in action

CORA Services celebrated 50 years of service to Philadelphia region families on April 28, 2022. The Love in Action gala took place at National Constitution Center in Philadelphia. The event centered on remembering how and why CORA began serving, who they are today, and what is opening up next.

This was really CORA's 51st anniversary; last year's celebration was virtual because of COVID. This year was the real deal. It was also the first in-person, off-campus event since the pandemic, so people were giddy with seeing each other face-to-face. The room was filled to capacity with people who attended.

There were traditional hors d'oeuvres downstairs in the gathering area (caterers walking around with trays, real nice) and then we were called upstairs to the seating area. It was not a traditional seated hotel dinner. It had heavy hors d'oeuvres stations, and we circulated around and returned as often as we wanted. The flow was great.

CORA celebrated using the rubric of Family – the CORA family supporting and supported by various "families." They chose 10 families to honor, including the nephews of Sr. Charity Kohl, founder of CORA, along with several

CORA played a video montage that featured representatives from all of these "families." After the video, CORA called two representatives from each family (one family at a time) to receive an award.

The award for each honoree was a pink heart-shaped glass

sculpture with the inscription "2022 Love In Action Honoree" and the name of the awardee (in our case, The Sisters of The Good Shepherd).

Our two representatives for receiving the award were Maria Sowerby, who worked at CORA for some 35 years, and Sr. Brigid Lawlor, who is currently on the Board and was present and



supportive when Sr. Charity founded CORA Services.

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Attendees had been enthusiastic about every presentation (not merely polite applause, much more fun than that), but when Sisters Brigid and Maria went up, they gave the Sisters a standing ovation. I found myself crying.

The award is gorgeous and we are all afraid to try to pick it up, lest we drop it. It's really heavy. Sr. Brigid drove the award home with her to Silver Spring and then gave it its own suitcase with mucho packing to fly it to St. Louis when she came for the Spring Area Meeting. The award is displayed on a table in the dining room at the Province Center for all to see and appreciate.

Gracenter reaches milestone in providing 90 years of service to women in recovery

Good Shepherd Sisters in the San Francisco community celebrated 90 years of service to San Francisco at the 9:30 a.m. Mass on Good Shepherd Sunday, May 8, 2022, along with members of their Guild.

In the midst of the Great Depression in 1932, the Sisters arrived in San Francisco to provide safety, healing, and a productive future for young women in vulnerable situations.

That very year, the Sisters organized the Good Shepherd Guild, which conducted its first fundraiser. The Guild has been supporting the Sisters' ministry at Gracenter ever since.

Gracenter is a transitional residence that helps low income women break free of drug and alcohol addiction. Approximately 95% of graduates continue to be successful in their recovery, their employment, and in stable housing long after graduating from Gracenter.

On May 7, Sisters in the San Francisco community also celebrated the beatification of our very own Sr. Agustina (Aguchita) Rivas, who was murdered in Peru in 1990 by the terrorist group, the Shining Path.

We joined countless other Sisters and Partners-in-Mission around the world as we watched the live stream of the beatification from Peru.

## Sister Alena Bernert tells her vocations story

"I wanted to enter the convent right after high school, but my dad wanted me to wait a year. So, I entered when I was 19 years old in 1946."

Alena Bernert took her first vows three years later in 1949. She took her final vows in 1952. But for all practical purposes, her journey as a Sister began much earlier, when she was an adolescent.

Sometime during her 7th or 8th grade year, the church she attended with her family in Steubenville, Ohio, was holding a novena, where people could put their prayer requests in a box. The young Alena dropped a slip of paper in the box that read, "Please watch over me so I can enter a convent."

The parish priest ran a Catholic Action Group that Alena was a part of. It just so happened that the priest, Fr. Francis Maloney, was the brother of a Good Shepherd Sister. Alena mentioned something to the priest about her desire to be a nun. He suggested that Alena get in touch with his sister, Mary Patricia Maloney, RGS.

Without hesitation, Alena contacted the Sister and soon found herself boarded on a train to the Cincinnati convent to meet Sr. Mary Patricia.

"I spent the night in the convent and Sr. Maloney told me everything about being a Sister of the Good Shepherd. When the time came years later for me to enter religious life, I entered Good Shepherd through Carthage, Ohio," said Sr. Alena.

Interestingly, Alena's formative years had been shaped by Dominican Sisters who taught her from grade school through high school. Although the Dominicans had been her teachers, she didn't know any of them personally.

"Sister Maloney was the first Sister of any order I developed a relationship with. It took a long time to tour the Carthage convent, so we got to know each other pretty well over the course of two days. I didn't fully understand the mission of Good Shepherd, but I liked the convent, and I liked Sr. Maloney. My vocation calling came from the friendliness of a nun. I entered Good Shepherd because of her," Sr. Alena said.

As time went by, Sr. Alena came to fully understand the Good Shepherd mission and said she is glad Good Shepherd accepted her. Religious life has fulfilled her. After joining the order, she went to John Carroll University in Cleveland, where she graduated Cum Laude in Social Studies.

on the walls in her room to reflect on them.

She then went on to receive a Masters Degree in clinical psychology from the Jesuit's Xavier University. She received a second Masters Degree in Religious Studies from St. Louis University.

#### **Psychologist at Good Shepherd schools**

"I was considered the psychologist at our Good Shepherd schools Our Lady of the Highlands in Fort Thomas, Kentucky; Mary Crest in Cleveland; Vista Maria in Detroit; Villa Maria in Grand Rapids; and Rosemont in Columbus. I also taught regular classes and whatever else the schools needed for me to teach," she said.

Sister Alena remembers one student in particular. She was three years old and orphaned when she came to Cincinnati at Good Shepherd Girls Town. The Sisters developed her singing voice and she went on to become a famous singer.

"I always felt that it was an outstanding achievement for one of our Good Shepherd girls to attain status as a professional singer. This was very special," Sr. Alena said.

In an ironic twist of fate, Sr. Alena found herself back in the fold of Dominican Sisters many years after leaving high school, when she needed a place to stay. She was the only Sister left on the grounds after shutting down Rosemont and had nowhere to live. The Dominicans took her into their Motherhouse in Columbus, where Sr. Alena lived for four and a half years. In 2017, Sr. Alena moved into St. Margaret Hall in Cincinnati.

"Good Shepherd is where I was always meant to be. This was my calling," she said.

Sister Alena was one of 11 children born into a large Catholic family. The family was pretty evenly split between six girls and five boys, including one set of twins. Alena was the only one of the children to enter religious life.

## Journey to Justice campaign

The pursuit of justice is lifelong work and Good Shepherd Volunteers (GSV) has been helping young people begin their journey for nearly three decades. It's a journey that has led GSV alumni to become social workers, teachers, lawyers, and advocates – taking the values learned during their year forward into a lifetime of engaged compassion.

Our spring Journey to Justice fundraising campaigns allowed us to offer training, retreats, and support to our volunteers so they can increase capacity at social service agencies, working in education, youth counseling, juvenile justice, domestic violence, and public policy and advocacy.

As part of our fundraising efforts, GSV Board member and alum Saul Martinez embarked on a one-day, 200-mile bicycle ride with Unbound Gravel to raise awareness and funds for the life-changing work at GSV. We surpassed our goal and raised \$22,374!

#### Sister Tram in the news for her work at Bilingual International

The St. Louis-based Bilingual International Senior Center operates Missouri's only center devoted to senior immigrants and refugees. Most older adults at the center speak little English. Bilingual International helps them study for citizenship tests, translate important letters, and communicate with their physicians. Every senior group has a group leader who speaks their preferred language.

Good Shepherd Sister Anna Tram Nguyen is a case worker at Bilingual International and group leader for seniors who immigrated to the US from Vietnam.

A recent episode on National Public Radio's *St. Louis on the Air* podcast featured Bilingual International and individuals who participate in its program for seniors. When a reporter asked Net Huynh, who immigrated from Vietnam 29 years ago, about her experience with the center, Sister Tram translated for her.

The center hosts gatherings, communal birthdays, and holiday celebrations for older adults from Albania, China, Vietnam, and several African countries, providing a place where they can come together as a peer group and speak their native language.

Due to Covid-19 shutdowns, the center also was closed, leaving the seniors feeling vulnerable and isolated. Now,

## Heeding the Fierce Urgency of Now

The National Advocacy Center of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd (NAC) was among the sponsors of the 2022 Ecumenical Advocacy Days (EAD).

The theme of the virtual conference was "Fierce Urgency: Advancing Civil and Human Rights," drawing inspiration from Martin Luther King's 1967 "Beyond Vietnam" speech.

The three-day event included excellent speakers, engaging workshops, and powerful worship that illustrated every person is created in God's image, imbued with dignity and with a voice meant to be heard, heeded, and treated justly. The theme beautifully reflected the Good Shepherd core value of individual worth.

I was both a part of the EAD organizing team and an attendee. I worked behind the scenes with different faith organizations to showcase their expertise on issue

areas, helping to ensure a rich array of workshops, which informed and animated participants' advocacy visits that are held on the conference's closing day.

#### Legislatives asks

I participated in an excellent workshop that focused on the conference's domestic legislative "ask"— the Freedom to Vote: John R. Lewis Act.

Thanks to the earnest and impassioned workshop speaker who had read all 730+ pages of the legislation and provided an excellent historical background on U.S. voting rights, I went into the Maryland advocacy visits with an even stronger foundation and conviction. While our senators are friendly to the bill, constituent support remains important.

The meeting also enabled us to strategize how we might bolster support among other senators. Action at the federal level is crucial. Our vote is our voice – everyone must have access to this fundamental right.

EAD's international ask urged the Senate to support a newer piece of legislation, the <u>Safeguarding Human Rights in Arms Exports Act</u>. The Act enhances congressional oversight of U.S. arms sales.

Erin Hood, NAC's Good Shepherd Volunteer, also helped with EAD planning. She worked tirelessly on the team that was tasked with scheduling Senate lobby visits. Larry Couch, now retired from NAC, was kind enough to offer a poetry workshop with a few poet friends. Larry's evening workshop was a welcome respite for conference participants.

I left EAD energized by a shared commitment to justice and the role NAC plays on federal and global levels.

During the May 2-6 virtual and in-person encounters, participants asked U.S. Senators — who are considering climate provisions in budget legislation — to support climate and clean energy investments that reduce dependence on fossil fuels, lower national greenhouse gas emissions, create jobs, and build the resilience of impacted communities.

The campaign approach seeks to manifest a change of heart. The meetings between Catholic constituents and

their senators are strongly centered upon the Catholic faith and transcend partisanship.

### Pollution number one risk factor for disease and premature death

The Lancet Commission on Pollution and Health published a new report May 17, 2022, which finds that pollution remains the world's leading environmental risk factor for disease and premature death, despite advances in cleaner water and safer indoor cooking.

"It is increasingly clear that pollution is a planetary threat, and that its drivers, its dispersion, and its effects on health transcend local boundaries and demand a global response," the report's authors said.

Co-lead author Philip Landrigan reports that the levels of pollution stemming from current economic models reflect "the throwaway culture" that Pope Francis has condemned. He sees this as an opportunity for religious leaders to step up and speak to the moral and ethical dimensions of polluting the planet.

<u>Catholic bishops of Brazil</u> are paying attention and raising their voices, specifically about the deadly effects of chemical pollution through mining.

"Mining represents death for the Indigenous peoples," according to Archbishop Roque Paloschi. He said, "It contaminates their water and is responsible for the spread of diseases like malaria because mosquitoes breed in abandoned mining pits. Mining also increases food insecurity, because heavy machinery causes animals that the Yanomami depend on for hunting to relocate.

Auxiliary Bishop Vicente, the secretary of the Bishops'
Conference's Special Commission on Integral Ecology and Mining, said, "Beginning with Catholics, we have to raise awareness about the need to divest from mining."

He said, "Our greatest challenge is to carry out concrete actions to face that enormous power (of the mining industry). We still do not know how to stop that Goliath."

## Aguchita beatified May 7

The beatification of Sister Agustina ("Aguchita") Rivas, RGS, took place on May 7, 2022. Invited guests participated in a Mass and procession in Lima, Peru, with Aguchita's relic. They also attended a vigil Mass in San Ramon, which was followed the next morning by the beatification Mass in La Florida. Mid-North America Sisters and Partners-in-Mission who didn't attend watched the live stream of the beatification and took part in their own events and rituals to honor Aguchita. 


