

Another event at Gracenter in April brought together women in residence with some of their family members for a work day of weeding and gardening.










#### Maryhurst

The emphasis at the National Advocacy Center (NAC) over the past few months has been on human trafficking, migration, immigration, racism and Syria.

All of these issues have significant impact on one another, and all of the issues are critically important to the mission and ministry of Good Shepherd Sisters around the world.

Please consider traveling to Washington, DC, for NAC's first oneday conference on human trafficking. The event is on May 15, 2018, and everyone is welcome.



#### **Racism**

The National Advocacy Center was an official endorser of the Rally to End Racism on the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King's assassination. The rally took place on April 4, 2018, in Washington, DC. Organized by the National Council of the Churches of Christ, the Rally to

End Racism drew hundreds to the National Mall for interfaith prayer services for speeches on racial inequality.

#### **Svria**

NAC also helped prepare, and then signed, a Statement Against Military Action in Syria opposing missile strikes. The letter was co-signed by more than 35 faith leaders representing a wide range of Catholic organizations, including the Congregation of Our Lady of Charity of the Good Shepherd, U.S. Provinces.

# Joan Newman Angela Newman

July 22, 1937 – April 9 and April 13, 2018

Identical twins Joan and Angela Mary Newman were born In Durban, South Africa, to a Catholic mother and non-practicing Christian father. They were not raised Catholic and did not receive the sacraments until 1960.

Joan and Angela grew up near the ocean and maintained a love for the beach and wonders of the sea all of their lives. They traveled a good bit as young adults and took their religion seriously. In Surry, England, in 1963, Joan entered the Sisters of the Eucharist. Angela Mary followed in 1964. The Sisters of the Eucharist were a Contemplative Community with daily Exposition of the Eucharist, making vestments and altar breads. They also taught religious education.

The Newmans were missioned to the U.S. in Washington, DC, where the Community taught **Religious Education** and ran a small residential facility for elderly women of means. In the early 1980's the Sisters of the Eucharist withdrew from the U.S. and gave their Sisters the option of returning to Europe or transferring to another Congregation in the U.S. In 1983 Sisters

Joan and Angela transferred to the Sisters of the Good Shepherd: Joan as a Contemplative Sister and Angela Mary as an Active Apostolic Sister.

Sister Joan was considered a hard worker, especially in the Altar Bread Department in New York, Pennsylvania and Washington DC, before going to our Senior Community in Baltimore. Sister Joan was missioned recently to Immaculate Heart Infirmary in St. Louis upon the closure of the Baltimore community.

Sister Angela Mary served as Counselor in our Residential Treatment Program in Baltimore. She also served as Parish Social Worker and Religious Education Teacher in Clark Summit, Baltimore, and Philadelphia. She ministered in a homeless shelter in Philadelphia. Sister Angela managed the Altar Bread Department in Baltimore. Every month she drove to New York or Pennsylvania to visit her sister Joan. Sister Angela also came to Immaculate Heart Convent as her medical needs increased.

The Newman Sisters have family in Johannesburg and Durbin, South Africa. They have one surviving sister, Doreen, and several nieces and nephews.

Time before the Blessed Sacrament had been very

# Mary Teresa Floyd

May 31, 1931 – April 2, 2018

Sister Mary Teresa Floyd was born in Barnesville, North Carolina, and was the youngest of five siblings. After high school, Teresa went to work in Washington, DC, where she met a Catholic friend who introduced her to a Benedictine Sister, Sister Hildegarde. When Teresa did not go home to Raleigh on weekends, she would go to the Benedictine Monastery and visit with Sister Hildegarde.

Teresa was baptized at St. Matthew's in Washington, DC, and eventually met the Good Shepherd Sisters. She entered Good Shepherd on April 24, 1952.

Sister Teresa enjoyed her work with the children that Good Shepherd served in Baltimore. One of the students from those early years, Bobbie, had continued to stay in touch with her.

Former student Bobbie considered Sister Teresa to be the only mother she ever had.

Bobbie considered Sr. Teresa the only mother she ever knew. Bobbie married, raised three children, and is a grandmother and great grandmother. She was saddened to hear that Sr. Teresa had died in Danville, Pennsylvania, before she had been able to visit her there.

Sister Teresa was sociable and brought joy to every encounter and situation. She had the grace to communicate her love and caring skills with everyone with whom she worked, inspiring them with the Good Shepherd spirit and love for the individual.

She ministered in Reading and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in Raleigh, North Carolina, Guam and Orlando, Florida. She served in Orlando for 19 years, established a program for homeless women and children, and was a vibrant member of the Good Shepherd Parish Community.

Sister Teresa was missioned to St. Joseph Residence in Baltimore when her health began to decline. She had deep gratitude for all of the staff there and loved being in

# Doris Martin, Companion of Jesus the Good Shepherd

March 18, 1931 - February 27, 2018

Doris "Doree" Martin was a faithful daughter of St. Mary Euphrasia and St. John Eudes. She shepherded the Canadian Companions of Jesus the Good Shepherd well for 20 years, from 1995-2015.

Doree made her final offering of consecration on June 4, 2000. One legacy she left was her zeal shown at 22 Pauline Avenue, Toronto. It was here that she and Patricia, a former Sister of St. Joseph, started Resurrection House next to her parish church. The ministry served the poor in the area of giving clothing, food and shelter. Doree's giving spirit reminded me of Sr. Mary Aquinas Lee's description of St. Mary Euphrasia's zeal:

"When St. Mary Euphrasia came in obedience from Tours to Angers, the building put at her disposal was a disused cotton factory. There on the loom of daily circumstances, our saint and her dear daughters toiled. The warp of Mary's constant prayer crossing the weft of Martha's orderly and laborious industry, produced, hour-by-hour, the fabric of holiness. And as they labored, we know how much they were aware of the ceaseless murmur of the waters of God's Spirit, a lament echoing deep in our hearts: Seek my sheep; a soul is of more value than a world."

When Patricia passed away, Doree, who was also starting to get sick, gave up the ministry. She gave away all of her worldly goods and retired to her new retirement home with only a suitcase of her belongings. This was her legacy of simple living, her vow of poverty.

Doree passed away peacefully at age 87 in her retirement home in Ontario, Canada. Maria Figredo, Theresa Patrocinio and I represented the Companions of Jesus the Good Shepherd at a memorial Mass for Doree on March 6, 2018.

The funeral Mass on March 3rd was held at her parish church, St. Gregory. Ten Good Shepherd Sisters attended the funeral Mass, along with four Companions, Doree's family members, and her friends. Father John Bertao celebrated the funeral Mass.

In his homily, Fr. Bertao said that Doree inspired him to become a priest. Doree was among those who journeyed with him throughout his seminary training.

On the day Doree died I saw a heartshaped rainbow in the sky. What a consoling sign of love between Companions after more than two decades of journeying together.

Doree, in the name of all Companions, thank you! Enjoy eternity with all of our Good Shepherd Sisters and Companions of Jesus the Good Shepherd. We will miss you. Pray for us.

that abnormal dryness or drought continues to affect 80% of California's population — nearly 30 million people.

The California drought, Flint, Michigan water crisis, and oil spills in waterways all highlight the many critical challenges to water supplies for Earth's people, creatures and plants. Each is a particular wake up call to Good Shepherd, with our special focus on girls and women worldwide.

Girls and women have the closest relationship to water, often carrying it far distances for use in cooking, cleaning, bathing children, washing clothes and for sanitation.

In support of the rights of all people to clean water, Mid-North America Province Communities and individuals reported the following actions they are taking to conserve water and prevent water pollution:

- Cutting the number of showers; not watering lawns; comparing monthly water bills
- Making plans to get a water barrel; collecting run-off shower water or dishwashing rinse water to use for watering plants
- Buying efficient shower heads and using eco settings on dishwasher and washing machines
- Eliminating nitrate fertilizer and pesticides on lawns and gardens
- Reducing the use of plastic bags and avoiding water in plastic bottles
- Using Christmas money to help with the building of a water system for our Good Shepherd mission in Burkina Faso (money sent through the Good Shepherd International Foundation)

- Watching for and signing on to legislative actions through the National Advocacy Center network, which affect the environment, particularly water issues at both federal and state levels
- Praying for Care of the Earth, specifically for places like Cape Town, South Africa, where water shortage is critical

Jeanette represents Good Shepherd at the monthly InterCommunity Ecological Council meetings in St. Louis. She attended two author events in April that were focused on water and eco spirituality. One was with local authors of a book on

changes to the landscape along the Missouri River as seen through the eyes of nine generations of children. The other author event featured Jesuit priest activist and Nobel Peace Prize nominee John Dear. Dear's latest book, *They Will Inherit The Earth*, is about peace and nonviolence in a time of climate change.

Dear draws on the connection that Jesus makes at the start of his Sermon on the Mount between our practice of nonviolence and our unity with creation.

Dear says our rejection of nonviolence is inevitably linked to the catastrophic effects of climate change and environmental ruin. Through personal stories of his life in the desert of New Mexico, his time as a chaplain at Yosemite, his friendship with indigenous and environmental leaders, his experience at the Standing Rock protests, as well as his work with the Vatican on a new stance on nonviolence, John Dear invites us to return to nonviolence as a way of life and a living solidarity with Mother Earth and her creatures.

Eco Zeal for Mission thanks everyone for their energetic commitment in our Year of Water.

What next? We encourage a focus on preventing the plastic pollution which plagues our oceans, kills sea life and rises on the food chain onto our dinner tables. (See the United Nations website www.unenvironment.org)

### Good Shepherd on streets of Thailand to fight trafficking

The Fountain of Life Women's Center in Pattaya, Thailand, helps women who work in Thailand's sex tourism trade find an alternative to earning money. The Center is a ministry of Sisters of the Good Shepherd.

"Many think helping women get out of lives of prostitution means you rehabilitate them, take them out of the bar," said Sr. Michelle Lopez, founder of the Fountain of Life Women's Center.

"After we worked with them, we realized you can't quite do that — it's just not possible. When we approach trafficking, we have to do so with a new vision. Our vision has been empowering women," Sr. Michelle said.

The Good Shepherd Sisters have been in Pattaya since 1988. Four Good
Shepherd Sisters run the center. An average of 250 women are enrolled in morning and afternoon skills training courses, as well as taking advantage of counseling, Classes and other services help give them alternatives to working on the street or being taken advantage of as trafficking victims. Volunteers, usually from Germany or Denmark, teach different levels of English classes so the women can work in reputable hotels and in other tourist industries.

#### Staying centered and strong

To keep their own spiritual energy strong, the Sisters are up at 4:30 a.m. for an hour of meditation. They then meet for prayer and Mass. Sisters, staff and volunteers gather at 8 a.m. for spiritual reading, reflection and sharing. Most of the staff is not Catholic, so the readings draw not only from the Gospels, but also from Buddhism and other sources. The morning time is important to center everyone and to prepare them for the draining stories they will hear throughout their day.

A separate Good Shepherd <u>Children's Center</u> nearby cares for 140 children, about half of whom belong to the women at the Fountain of Life Women's Center. The rest are from economically disadvantaged families in the area.
