for the staff.

Sister Madeleine Munday, province leader for Mid-North America, said, "We are proud to play a part in this exciting new development, and we hope it spurs continued growth in Normandy."

Good Shepherd Sisters arrived in south St. Louis in 1849, where it had a strong presence on Gravois Avenue. Anne Lucas Hunt, who often gave land and money to Catholic and other civic organizations, donated the property

in Normandy to the Sisters in 1874 and additional land in 1878 so the Sisters could escape tuberculosis and cholera, which plagued St. Louis at the time. The full press release may be found on our website at https://bit.ly/3StLpvn

CLT visits St. Louis

LCWR (Leadership Conference for Women Religious) held its 2022 assembly in St. Louis from August 9-12. The assembly brought together nearly 700 leaders of orders of Catholic Sisters, including the Congregational Leadership Team (CLT) for Sisters of the Good Shepherd and Province Leadership Teams (PLT) for Mid-North America, New York-Toronto, and Central South.

The event encouraged women religious to explore sources of wisdom that can assist navigating the change women's religious leadership is experiencing. Set as a series of spiritual conversations, the assembly observed major world shifts and movements taking place

Much of the conversation focused on the relationship between the loss of place being experienced worldwide and within the lives of women religious and the transformation of consciousness that is underway.

A series of three dialogues among LCWR members, including Gayle Lwanga Crumbley, RGS, augmented the conversations.

Mission Partners review history of Black Catholic nuns in US to deepen understanding of racism

Good Shepherd Mission Partners studied the book *Subversive Habits* through three online discussions in September.

The book study was a follow-up to the province Area Meetings this spring and early summer, when Sisters watched and discussed videos about systemic racism and white privilege.

"The book had been just released and it seemed like felicitous timing to study it as a next step in understanding racism," said Mary Carol McClenon, a participant and member of the Province Leadership Team (PLT).

According to Sister Mary Carol, "The PLT has not yet determined what the next step is for the commitment in the Province Direction Statement to "acknowledge and address racism within ourselves, in our structures, and in the wider social context."

More than 60 Mission Partners (lay and Sisters) participated in the online study. They acknowledged the book as being both interesting and painful to read, making such comments as:


"It is a very difficult topic and can bring up painful memories."

"I think it might help if at some point we can discuss where to go from here."

"I had no idea that women religious congregations in the US had owned slaves. This was shocking."

"I know a lot about racism and diversity, but this definitely included new information I had never encountered about racism in the church. Much appreciated!"

"The entire presentation was very well put together. The ending gave me so much hope - the panel discussion with the amazing and beautiful reconciliation between the



woman who had been rejected by the St Joseph congregation and the current leadership there. That filled me with joy and hope."




Construction nearing completion at Gracenter

Five Sisters from the Danville community traveled to Lancaster, Pennsylvania, to watch the stage performance DAVID at the Sight and Sound Theatre.

It was better than Broadway. Actors walked in the aisles, and we were thrilled to see real sheep, a llama, horse, and camel. The experience brought Israel directly to us.

I went to the performance with Sisters Mary Catherine Massei, Frances Altavilla, Carmen Flores, and Charlotte Kirst. We saw Amish in their horse and buggies on the way home from Lancaster.

I continue my mission of online counseling with survivors of human trafficking and domestic violence. Three families traveled from Boston, San Francisco, and Seattle recently to meet with me and reunite with women family members who had been trafficked.

All of us in the Danville community are happy to see an abundance of wildlife where we live. We see deer, rabbits, foxes, possums, turtles,

covotes, eagles, blue birds, robins, osprey with nests in the tower of the Basilica, and even a small bear cub who made himself at home in our outdoor prayer circle.

Sister Kathleen Moore and her sister Marie Moore saw each other in September for the first time in three vears.

Marie lives at Mason Pointe in Chesterfield, near St. Louis. Sister Mary Carol McClenon is a member of the St. Louis community and brought Marie with her when she traveled from St. Louis to Danville to visit our community.







Gracenter

Gracenter held a successful fundraiser in September to support the mission of supporting women in recovery.

Sisters of the Good Shepherd and the Good Shepherd Guild are celebrating 90 years of service to disadvantaged young women in San Francisco.

Sisters started their ministry in San Francisco in 1932 when they opened a school for girls who were in the juvenile justice system. Sisters ran University Mound School for Girls from 1932 to approximately 1980. Gracenter was a transitional home for graduates from University Mound from 1961-1980. In the late 1980s Sr. Jeanne Waddell asked Sr.

Sharon O'Grady to help figure out the greatest need of the women in Gracenter; it was the unaddressed addiction of most of the women, which led to their homelessness. Consequently, Gracenter became a drug and alcohol treatment residence for women in approximately 1990.

CORA Good Shepherd Mediation

CORA Good Shepherd Mediation presented Philly Peace Day on September 21 with a public Open House. The focus of the Open House was to inform about restorative justice, mediation, and other peacemaking tools through an interactive installation with arts and crafts, quizzes, and videos.

The Disney film *Encanto* was also featured, along with a post-film discussion about how the accountability and forgiveness expressed in the film connects to conflict resolution.

Good Shepherd Shelter

Good Shepherd Shelter will hold its annual gala virtually on October 8. The shelter has been giving survivors of domestic violence hope for the future since 1977, first as a sponsored ministry of Sisters of the Good Shepherd and now as a program of Catholic Charities. The shelter will honor Sr. Madeleine Munday, Mid-North America province leader, with the St. Mary Euphrasia Award for dedicated service to the shelter.

CELEBRATION OF LIFE ZEAL

Nellie Marie Hawkins, RGS

June 5, 1934 – July 22, 2022

Sister Nellie Marie Hawkins was born on June 5, 1934, in Washington, DC. She was the oldest of 14 children born to George and Teresa Hawkins.

Sister Nellie grew up on a tobacco and animal farm in Prince George County, Maryland. Discerning a vocation to religious life, she first entered the Oblate Sisters of Providence and then came to join the Good Shepherd contemplative Sisters in Baltimore.

Ripples of prayer

If we were to describe Sr. Nellie in one word, it would be "faithful." She was faithful to her contemplative vocation, to her family, and to her African American heritage. At a directed retreat in the 1970s she promised to rise at 3:00 am to be at prayer at 3:30. She kept this promise until the day before she died.

Sister Nellie believed in prayer. She described her prayer as a stone

being tossed into a pool that intersected with the ripples of all others who were praying.

She felt that it was important to remember that she did not pray alone. During a retreat where clay was used, she made a boat and explained that she felt she was sailing in the boat with all of God's people.

Sister Nellie had a special way of relating to others and people always looked forward to being with her.

One day when a Sister was coughing and clearing her throat constantly in chapel, Sr Nellie announced at the meal that she was delighted whenever she hears this happening. It makes her feel that she is not alone and that others are with her supporting her in prayer.

Altar bread prayers

Sister Nellie enjoyed baking and cutting the hosts for Eucharistic celebrations. As she prepared the hosts, she prayed especially for the people who would be receiving the altar bread that she had made.

Both Pope John Paul II and Pope Francis consecrated hosts that Nellie made when they were in Philadelphia. She was proud of this and kept a picture of Pope John Paul elevating her host.

Sister Nellie's handcrafted Christmas cards were often the first cards her friends received during the holiday season. She liked

making and sending Christmas cards and keeping in touch with others in this way.

Her face would light up when she received responses from those she contacted. She had a special way of relating to others and people always looked forward to being with her.

Sister Nellie felt that her gift to the community was to play the guitar at the liturgy. She also selected the theme and hymns that she believed to be appropriate for the celebrations. She took special care in doing this, and it was evident in her choices.

Sister Nellie was unique. She brought a special flavor to the community, adding spice and humor.

Bernadette Bates, Companion

August 19, 1945 – July 31, 2022

Bernadette "Bernie" Bates and her twin sister Theresa were the 13th and 14th of 15 children born to Leonard and Margaret Bates.

When the newborns were taken to the convent to be celebrated, one of the Sisters laid the twins on the altar, consecrating them to God. For Bernie, this was providential, as she went on to live a life devoted to following Jesus.

After graduating from Our Lady of Grace High School in Indianapolis, Indiana, Bernie went to work for the Sisters of the Good Shepherd at Marydale. When the Sisters closed Marydale, she moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, and worked for the Sisters at Girls Town until the ministry closed.

Rose Virginie Warnig, RGS, invited Bernie in the early 1990s to become a Companion of Jesus the Good Shepherd. She accepted and took all four of the Good Shepherd vows.

Bernie had a simple and unassuming personality. She accepted people unconditionally and always let others know how precious they were in the eyes of God. She mentored other candidates, fed the homeless, organized home Bible studies, and worked with inmates in a women's prison ministry.


Domestic Violence Awareness Month
